

#### 1. Gut Check



**Some people look at a worm and see bait. Bernny Ramirez sees the future.**Working in the laboratory of Arshad Kudrolli, professor and chair of the Physics Department, the Clark senior conducts experiments with hydrogels and *Eisenia Fetida* to determine how worms move through various substances, like sand and clay, and



— wait for it — bodily fluids. The research is expected to inform the development of robotic worms that may one day thread their way through digestive tracts and other tight spaces in the human body to help with medical diagnoses and treatments. Robot worms that will save lives? In the Clark lab this isn't science fiction. It's science.

#### 2. Jaws of Life



**Sharks may be the most feared animals on the planet (rows of razor-sharp teeth tend to hurt a reputation),** but where others see a threat, Colin Sterling sees life-saving beauty. The senior biology major worked alongside renowned cancer researcher Dr. Richard Pietras '69 to examine how squalamine, a compound derived from the liver of



the dogfish shark, inhibits the biochemical process that promotes the growth of breast cancer tumors. The findings may help lead to new therapeutic approaches for managing the disease and improving patients' survival rates. And the sharks? They may turn out to be the friendliest fish in the sea.

#### 3. For Eva



**Eva Mozes Kor and her twin sister Miriam were among the lucky ones.** They survived the inhuman experiments the notorious Nazi doctor Josef Mengele performed on 3,000 sets of twins at the Auschwitz death camp during World War II. Remarkably, Eva later forgave Mengele and founded the CANDLES museum, dedicated to those who endured

his atrocities. Her story inspired Clark senior Casey Bush to work at Eva's museum, and to interview her about the complex subject of forgiveness. Casey's research is dedicated to preserving the precious legacies of the twins and other casualties of the Holocaust, while insisting the world not only heeds this terrible history, but never repeats it.


**They don't wear capes or have superpowers,** but Clark boasts its own team of heroes. The students in the Human-Environment Regional Observatory (HERO) program are a force for good in cities where trees are threatened by everything from pollution to insect infestation. Our students were on the front lines when the Asian Longhorned Beetle invaded Worcester, destroying tens of

thousands of trees. They went to battle alongside local, state, and federal agencies to research and execute solutions for restoring this precious resource. Today, students like Yeannet Ruiz work to "green" other cities across the state. Because everybody needs a hero now and then. Even a tree.

#### 5. BIG Numbers



One million elephants roamed Africa in the 1970s. But poaching and habitat loss have led to a steep drop in their numbers, with the Great Elephant Census discovering that the savanna elephant population had declined 30 percent in seven years. The Wildlife Conservation Society sought an efficient, less intrusive way to count elephants rather than by airplane, and turned to geography professor

John Rogan's remote sensing class. Undergrad Nathan Jiwatram and two graduate students pored over a satellite image of Zimbabwe's Chizarira National Park and analyzed data. They "trained" GIS software to identify elephants in fuzzy pictures taken 400 miles above earth, giving conservationists one more tool to save the animals.

### 6. Ripple Effect



When mothers in Holliston, Massachusetts, questioned if there was a connection between discolored tap water and their children's medical problems, they called researchers at Clark. Spring Pillsbury heard her professor, Timothy Downs, discuss the issue, and asked to join his research team. Applying the GIS skills she learned at Clark, Spring helped analyze the




vulnerability of Holliston's drinking water wells to contaminants like manganese, mercury, and TCE. Spring presented her findings at the American Association of Geographers annual meeting and became co-author of a research journal article that drew the attention of towns, the media, government officials, and other researchers — and prompted additional investigations.

**Tess Reichart knows that words can inspire and amuse, engage and enrage,** move you to tears or just help you make sense of the world. The aspiring teacher now wants to be sure everyone else knows it, too. Tess recently interned in Dublin, Ireland, with a program called Fighting Words, where she designed a curriculum for children,

teenagers, and young adults to encourage their self-expression through poetry, photography, cartoon studies, and fiction writing. She's done similar work at schools in Worcester, teaching and coaching kids to find the limitless power in words, then unleash them on the world.



The photographs were discovered in boxes, a century old and long unseen.

They depicted African-American families in Worcester, most of them posed formally inside and outside of their homes. But who were they? History professor Janette Greenwood and her students went to work, locating the descendants of many of the people in the photos, interviewing them, and learning their stories. Senior Alex Jeannotte and junior

Toni Armstrong met with members of the Perkins family to construct a genealogical record from their archival research. With their fellow students, they helped plan and execute a powerful exhibition at the Worcester Art Museum, attended by many whose forebears appeared in the photos. It was both a historic occasion, and a special family reunion.

#### 9. Stories in the Bones



Kara Fischer knows the tales that bones can tell. She spent the summer of 2016 at the Defense Prisoner of War/Missing in Action Accounting Agency laboratory in Oahu, Hawaii, assisting a team of scientists to identify the skeletal remains of U.S. soldiers killed during the Korean War. Kara helped conduct DNA analysis and other testing that not only revealed how the men



died but also provided essential clues to their histories — from a childhood broken wrist to the very spot where a fatal bullet entered the body. Kara plans a career in forensic anthropology, continuing to unravel the mysteries of the bones and learn the ending to their story.

## 10. Restless Research $\mathbf{Z}$ $\mathbf{Z}$

**Sherief Eldeeb is fascinated by how the brain** and the body function together, and when they clash, he needs to know why. The psychology major spent a part of last summer at the University of Washington, helping conduct a study of the sleep patterns of children with autism. The results will help improve our understanding of the links between autism spectrum disorders, sleep disturbances, and attention deficit.


This is why we structure our curriculum around the concept of Liberal Education and Effective Practice, or LEEP.

# Financial Aid


